 Refugee: People who have been forced to flee to other countries or leave their homeland to avoid various conflicts, disasters, or persecution (UN Refugee Convention, Article 1)

- War refugees: Syrian, Somali, Afghan refugees
- Political refugees: Yemeni, Kurdish, Venezuelan refugees
- Religious refugees: Rohingya refugees
- Climate refugees: Kiribati refugees

- Jewish refugees (1934): 2.5 million refugees fleeing Nazi oppression
- Palestinian refugees (1948): 700,000 refugees as a result of Jews building Israel in the Palestinian region

• Rwandan refugees (1990): 3 million refugees as tribal conflict spread to war

4. How many refugees are there? (as of 2024)

- 1.5% of the world's population
- Tripled in the past 15 years
- Major source countries: Syria, Yemen, Ukraine, Afghanistan, South Sudan, etc.



- Myanmar: Government's discriminatory policy against Rohingya and genocide (700,000 refugees)

- Emergency relief



• 120 million refugees and people subject to protection served (as of 2024)

 White Helmets: A civil defense organization voluntarily formed in 2014 by Syrian firefighters


 Rescuing people from the Syrian Civil War sites

 Founded the Afghan Institute of Learning and educated 14 million Afghan refugees over 21 years


